

Ministry Team Letter

15th June will be the 800th anniversary of the signing of the Magna Carta by King John at a location close to the banks of the River Thames at Runnymede in Surrey. In effect, it was a peace treaty between King John and his subjects, and was designed to end the more tyrannical tendencies John was inflicting during his reign without deposing him of his throne. At its core was the demand that everyone had to obey the law; including the king. In so doing it set limits on the power of the monarchy and established human rights for everyone in England.



But why celebrate something that happened 800 years ago? Not least, because it has a lasting influence today. Three of the 63 original clauses are still upheld in English law. The most notable is the right to trial by jury – trial by our peers or our equals. The core principle of equitable justice, first set down as a tenet in Magna Carta, underpins the life of our **society today. It's good to use the opportunity of this** anniversary to celebrate that we live in a just society, and reflect on what we might need to do to ensure we allow future generations to continue to benefit from that.

Another of the three of the original 63 clauses of Magna Carta **that remain in law today is the English Church's right to freedom. This means it's your Church – not the State's.** On the evening of Sunday 14th June at All Saint's Church there will be an informal service focused on celebrating Magna Carta. After sharing in coffee, tea and biscuits between 6 and 6:30 we will thank God in some modern and old favourite hymns, reflect on what Magna Carta meant and means, and offer prayers for our future. Why not come along to your Church and celebrate this great anniversary.




HELP ! HELP! We Need More Volunteer Drivers!!



Clifton Street Watch



Once more our village has seen few crime problems during the month of April, with both Anti-Social problems and burglary reduced to just one incident. This involved a potential burglary on Saturday 11th April around 10pm when an offender entered a building via an insecure, side door, it is unknown if a search was made or if anything was taken.

Our Clifton community are reminded the best way to reduce possibilities of attacks of this nature are:

- Make your boundaries difficult or impossible to climb over.
- Keep doors and windows locked at all times.
- Remove all keys from the locks and keep them in a safe place out of view.
- Keep hallways clear of valuables like keys, handbags and laptop where they may be seen.
- Check that side gates are locked.
- Keep bins, ladders and garden furniture locked away.
- Fit Window Restrictors to fan light windows.

Just because our village has seen very few problems this year, we must not become complacent and should all remain vigilant. Other local villages around us have suffered substantial crime figures over the past few months. In March, Henlow, Langford, Mepershall between them suffered 15 incidents, with Shefford and Arlesey together amounting to more than 100 such attacks.

Should you wish to learn more, Bedfordshire Police offers a team of trained Crime Reduction Officers, who provide advice on home security and crime prevention. Clifton Speedwatch Group

To the 8th May your Speed Watch Group made 25 traffic calming visits. Broad Street – 4 occasions; Church Street – 3; New Road – 5; Pedley Lane – 2; Shefford Road – 5; and Stockbridge Road – 6. Of the 2496 vehicles passing during those visits, I have reported 90. Using the new Stardome letter generating system letters were sent out to the offending motorists within two days.

The visits this year have, with one exception, been very successful in reducing the percentage of speeding vehicles to below 6%. On four occasions we have not had to make any reports. Unfortunately a visit to Pedley Lane produced a return of 20%. However the second visit did produce a lower percentage return of 6%. Hopefully, further visits will reduce the numbers of vehicles speeding down this road, which appears to be used as a “rat run”.

In addition to the Group’s visits, up to the 31st March, the Police Camera Van made 10 visits to the A507 (33 vehicles recorded); 2 to Broad Street (2); 4 to Shefford Road (14) and 4 to New Road (17). Regular meetings continue to take place with the Police. Traffic calming visits continue to be made by Arlesey, Campton, Henlow, Langford, Shefford and Upper Caldecote.

If you need a “kill your speed” refuse bin sticker, please let me know.

Charles Wicksteed was born in Leeds in 1847, the son of a clergyman. After an engineering apprenticeship he set up a steam plough contracting business in Norfolk at the age of 21. In 1871 he moved to Kettering and went on to set up an engineering workshop.

In 1913 he bought an area of land near Kettering. He wanted to create an open space for local families, many of whom lived in houses with no gardens, so that their children had to play in the streets. With his engineering company he provided both seats and playground equipment. Wicksteed Park was born, one of the first leisure parks in Great Britain. Indeed, he provided equipment for many such parks in Europe.

Besides the fun of the roller coasters, flume and pirate ship and rides there is also a nature reserve and 147 acres of restful parkland. He designed the railway but sadly he died before it opened in Easter 1931. "Cheyenne" one of the engines was built in Bedford.

In June this year, as in previous years, we will be taking a full coach of disadvantaged families, who wouldn't normally have such a day out, to Wicksteed Park. In addition, we also invite Bedfordshire Young Carers and give them a much needed break. We pay for not only the coach, but also for admission and access to all the rides and attractions, as well as providing a picnic lunch. The Anne Frank Trust’s flagship ‘Take a stand’ exhibition

The Anne Frank Trust UK took its flagship educational programme *Take a Stand* to Henlow CE Academy. The programme drew on the life of Anne Frank to empower young people to challenge prejudice and discrimination, promoting responsibility and respect for others. The exhibition showcased inspirational people such as Rosa Parks, Mandela and Gandhi who showed moral courage against injustice and prejudice.

The programme provided leadership development for Year 8 pupils who acted as exhibition guides, encouraging them to teach others about the legacy of Anne’s diary and helping them to understand the damage caused by hatred and prejudice.

Devastation in Nepal - Henlow Helps!

Fresh from her trip to Nepal over the Easter holidays, Henlow CE Academy teacher Mrs Albert has been instrumental in ensuring that Henlow pupils are fully alert and ready to respond to the disaster. In order to provide practical help for the people of Nepal, Henlow supported an initiative called AQUABOX, run by Rotary. A box of basic equipment is provided to a family, including tarpaulin, hammer, nails, basic hygiene items, some clothes, cooking utensils and a pot. The final item in the box is a microfilter, which, when attached to the box, can turn polluted water into clean drinking water via a small hand pump. The filters used are so fine, that no known bacteria are able to pass through it. They also prevent the spread of polio. Last week, Henlow pupils wore red, white, blue, green and yellow clothes; the colours of the famous Nepalese prayer flags. Pupils also held cake sales after lunch and staff held an auction of promises to raise more money. After 2 days of fundraising, Henlow had raised over £2000 for Aquabox, with some pupils raising well over £100 individually.

We shall be able to buy 12 boxes and some community boxes, which provide water for a whole village."
